Phonics

Today's sound is **'wh'** as in 'wheel'. Write it down for your child to copy a few times, saying it as they do so.

Wh – some **'wh'** words: **whale, wheel, while, which, whisper, white, when, why, what.**

Remember to keep up with this week's spellings:

plant, grass, pretty, wild, water, path, people, beautiful.

You could play a **'wh'** or **'w'** word game with your child.

Draw a line down a piece of paper or white/black board and write 'w' on one side and 'wh' on the other.

Say out loud either a 'wh' word or 'w' word and they have to say which column it belongs in and either they or you could write the word in the correct column.

Some 'w' words – wig, way, wag, with, walk, wave, want, **went**, wool, will, world, wink.

English

In the book you may have noticed that there are some pictures of trees / bushes that are shaped. This is called **topiary**. **Topiary** is the art of creating a sculpture by carefully clipping trees and bushes (shrubs) into specific shapes. The shrubs used in topiary are evergreen, and have small leaves.

Do you know what evergreen means? (Look at the science learning this week to find out!).

Have you ever been to any gardens or garden centres and seen topiary?

Look at the examples of topiary in the book (there is a bird and a butterfly on the front cover, and a giraffe, elephant and reindeer in the story).

Can you add a sculpture of your choice to your garden you drew yesterday? It can be anything from a shape like a sphere or spiral, to an animal, character, or object like a rocket! Colour it green as it will really be an evergreen tree / shrub.

Write a short letter (a few sentences) to Liam. Tell him your favourite garden from the book. Liam's favourite new garden was where it started on the train tracks, is that yours? Or maybe it was the animals, or the steps or jetty?

Tell him a couple of sentences about your garden including the topiary you have chosen!

You are now like one of the new gardeners from the storybook!






R.E.

Last week in R.E., we learned all about The Last Supper (the day before Jesus died) where Jesus shared food with his friends, including bread and wine.

During The Last Supper, Jesus told his friends that the bread represented his body and the wine represented his blood. Today, Christians still eat bread and drink wine at special occasions, such as at **Holy Communion**, to remind them of Jesus' sacrifice.

Watching the clip is entirely up to parental choice but I think you will agree how important and interesting it is to learn about other religions and cultures. After all, knowledge is power!
