<p>Phonics</p>	<p>Words of the week: many, people, plant, money, improve.</p> <p>Our focus for this week is to look at the alternative sounds for 's' as it can often appear differently in the written word. In today's lesson we will be looking at the alternative 'st' spelling.</p> <p>After that, we will finish the week with a recap of all of the alternative spellings we have learned.</p> <div data-bbox="436 778 1211 1142" data-label="Image"> </div>	<p>Find the PowerPoint for Friday Phonics on the school website. Write today's date and Phonics for the title. Look at slides 1 & 2 and ask if your children recognise each object then practise saying the words aloud and discuss their meanings and that these words use the 's' sound but are spelt with 'st'.</p> <p>Next, go to slide 3 and copy out the table into blue books and see how many words they can remember in 30 seconds, per spelling (You can change the timings to suit yourself). You can find all the spellings on slide 5.</p> <p>Finally, go to slide 6 and ask your child to write out the paragraph there, correcting any spelling mistakes they can find or you could print off the slide and just fill in the blanks. Alternatively, your child could just write down the correct spelling words in a list.</p> <p>The choice is yours!</p>

questions and should be able to answer them independently but they may still need some support from their adults.

Grammar reminders:

A **noun** is the name of an object, e.g. chair, table, book etc.

An **adjective** is a describing word, e.g. green, sticky, beautiful etc.

A **noun phrase** is a sentence that contains a noun and adjectives to describe the noun, e.g. The yellow banana.

Verbs are referred to as 'doing words', e.g. swim, running, jumping etc.

Past tense means to show that something has previously happened, e.g. The dog barked at me; the ship sailed away; the mouse ate the cheese.

Suffixes are letters which can be added to the end of a word to change its meaning, e.g. ing, es, est, er.

Some examples of how words change after adding a suffix are;

cook- cooks cooking

Bake- baking- baker

Happy- happier- happiest

In today's lesson we will find out more about Britain's favourite fruit- Bananas!

Fairtrade

What Does Fairtrade Mean?

Some people make a living out of growing or making things to sell. The food and products are shipped all over the world. If the people are not paid a fair price, they cannot live well. Fairtrade is about paying a fair price for things that we buy.



How Does Fairtrade Help?

- It gets better prices for crops.
- It provides better working conditions.
- Extra money is given to communities.



How Can You Help?

Fairtrade

What Does Fairtrade Mean?

What is fair? Is it fair that some people have more than others? Where you are born can affect how wealthy or poor you are. In lots of poor countries, people grow crops to make money. However, too often, people will not give them a fair price for their products. They cannot make any money unless they are given a fair price. Fairtrade is about making the world fairer. It is about giving a fair price for things that we buy. Without a fair price, people do not have money for essentials such as clothes and food.

Did You Know...?

Only one in three bananas sold in the UK is Fairtrade.



How Does Fairtrade Help?

Fairtrade helps to ensure that better prices are paid for crops. Better working conditions are provided so workers are treated well and families can afford to pay for their children to go to school.



Fairtrade also keeps farming sustainable so that crops can be grown year after year.



Fairtrade Products Around the World

Bananas

Many bananas come from the Ecuador. 78% of banana sellers in Ecuador said their standard of living had improved since joining Fairtrade.



Chocolate

Fairtrade helps farmers in Africa by guaranteeing minimum prices for cocoa beans. Certain supermarkets and shops are dedicated to providing Fairtrade chocolate.



Coffee

When Fairtrade coffee is bought, farmers can provide a better quality of life for their families. They are also able to grow better quality beans.



Sugar

Around 80% of sugar comes from sugar cane. It is grown by millions of farmers in developing countries. The price that many farmers receive for their sugar cane often fails to cover their costs.
