## Transport

Different types of transport are used for different types of journeys.

- Planes - to travel to different countries
- Rockets - to travel to space
- Trains - to travel locally or long distance
- Boats - to travel across water
- Bicycles - to travel locally.

How to be safe when using transport and travelling on foot

- Hold hands with an adult.
- Choose the right place to cross roads, e.g. at a crossing, at a place where you can clearly see traffic, i.e. not on the bend of a road.
- Understand how different types of crossings work, for example, pelican crossings, zebra crossings and traffic lights.
- Be sensible on the platform by staying behind the yellow line and using stairs safely at a station.
- Sit down on a moving bus.
