Key Vocabulary

History – everything that has ever happened in the past.

Timeline – a visual way of representing the past, always in chronological order.

Chronological – in order of time; the order in which things happened.

Past – things that have happened before now.

Present – things that are happening at the moment.

Change – when something becomes different, for history, this could be their clothes, their entertainment, their food or even the way they acted, thought or felt.

Similar – when two periods of time or things within those periods of time look or act in the same way, such as the way people dressed.

Different – when two periods of time or things within those periods of time do not look or act in the same way.

Source – where we have found out about something. This could be something someone has written, a painting, a photograph, a video or audio recording or someone talking about their memories.

Knowledge

Changes within living memory: e.g.; how shopping or schools has changed since the 1960s.

Significant individuals in the past: Neil Armstrong and The Beatles.
